Who can apply?	<p>VCFSE anchor organisations in Tameside and Glossop who have been particularly key throughout the pandemic. These independent community led organisations are generally defined as delivering multiple services or activities with and on behalf of local people within:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• A defined locality – place, (usually neighbourhood level)• A specialist area of expertise and/or• Represent a particular community of identity. <p>These anchors are rooted in the local area and have been there for years. In Tameside and Glossop they are usually small organisations that employ staff and work with volunteers from their local community to deliver their activities and run their organisation.</p>	
Grant amount:	This funding is one off, ‘non-recurrent’ emergency investment of up to £50,000 to be spent within an agreed timescale. This fund is finite, please only apply if you need to and for what you need.

Grant amount:	<p>The maximum grant available for a project is £28,000; however, this varies for some Jigsaw neighbourhoods.</p>

Small Grants Programme supported by The Linbury Trust		
Aims/priorities:	<p>The scheme aims to fund small capital improvements to theatres run by charities and not-for-profit groups that will make a big impact to a theatre's resilience, sustainability or accessibility. This can include works to make theatres COVID-secure and ready to reopen. Grants are available for small capital projects that will make a big impact to a theatre's resilience, sustainability or accessibility.</p> <p>Eligible projects include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Improvements and repairs to the building fabric • The installation of key plant and machinery. • Works or which make theatre buildings digital-ready. 	

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The purchase of key equipment (not software) to improve digital infrastructure. • Projects that help to make theatres COVID-secure for reopening. <p>This scheme will prioritise improvements to buildings that protect theatre use and remove barriers to participation and attendance.</p>
Who can apply?	<p>To be eligible, applicants must meet the following requirements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Own or manage theatres with titles or signed leases of more than five years on buildings in England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland. • Demonstrate that they run a regular theatre programme of professional, community and/or amateur work presenting no less than 30 performances a year. • Have a bona fide UK charitable or not-for-profit legal structure and be able to provide certified or audited accounts for at least two years.
Grant amount:	Grants of up to £5,000 are available
Application process:	Application forms are available to download from the Theatres Trust's website.

Aims/priorities:	<p>Funding is available for small-scale arts and/or community and social welfare projects in England and Wales.</p> <p>The Foundation favours revenue proposals over capital requests and focuses its funding on the following main themes:</p>	

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Rural - It is especially interested in projects that open up opportunity in areas where it might not otherwise exist and that help alleviate the isolation and other hardships that can affect rural communities. • Arts - It wants to help bring art to those people that it can help and help those who will go on to bring art to the people. It supports organisations that provide a wide range of educational and creative activities, including applied arts and crafts, music, drama, and textiles. It also funds arts education with a focus on helping promising young Welsh talent. • Community - It is attracted to projects that bring people together, to help each other out and make their community a better, more joyful place. Support is available for a range of community and social welfare projects, including those focused on helping people who suffer from isolation, mental health problems and financial and/or social disadvantage. • Small charities - The Foundation has an affinity with small charities, the ones set up by people who are driven by love and kindness to help better the lives of those around them. • Wales - Half of its funding goes to projects in Wales and it continues to maintain strong links with communities in mid-Wales.
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>Applications are accepted from UK registered charities and exempt charities.</p> <p>Other not-for-profit organisations, including unregistered charities, are also eligible to apply provided they are supported by a registered charity that can accept the grant on their behalf.</p> <p>It welcomes proposals from community museums, organisations, farms and gardens for funding for arts subjects.</p>

Grant amount:	There is no set limit on the amount that can be awarded; however, preference is given to requests that are below £10,000. Funding is generally awarded to one-off projects although funding over a number of years (up to three) will be considered if the project requires it.

Aims/priorities:	The Trust's aim is to support charitable work within their areas of priority. The Trust operates a three-year rotation system, with different fields of interests being funded each year: 2021: Homelessness; refugees and asylum seekers.	
Who can apply?	Organisations registered with the Charity Commission (England, Wales and Northern Ireland) or OSCR, or exempt from registration, can apply. Charities with an income of £1 million and above can apply for a grant of £5,000.

<p>Lloyds Bank Foundation for England and Wales - Racial Equity Funding</p>	
<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>The Foundation's Racial Equity funding strand is aimed at charities where more than half of their Trustee Board self-identify as belonging to a Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic community. The charity must have a focus on supporting people from specific Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic communities to overcome any of the following 11 Complex Social Issues:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Addiction and dependency on alcohol, drugs and/or gambling • Asylum seekers and refugees • Care leavers • Domestic and sexual abuse • Homeless and vulnerably housed • Learning disabilities • Mental health • Offending, prison or community service • Sexual exploitation • Trafficking and modern slavery • Young parents <p>Funding is available for core organisational costs which are related to the day to day running of the charity. Consideration will only be given to requests for core costs where over 50% of the charity's work and expenditure meets the Foundation's criteria. Funding is also available for costs associated with the direct delivery of the charity's work.</p>

	<p>The funding is for organisations supporting people (17 years and older) who are experiencing complex social issues resulting in a significant impact on their lives. Applicants need to demonstrate their work is ‘highly impactful’ and possess the following characteristics:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In-depth • Holistic and person-centred • Targeted • Supporting a journey of change • An appetite for development.
Who can apply?	<p>Applications will be accepted from registered charities that are led by and for members of specific Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic communities (more than half the Trustee Board must self identify as belonging to a Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic community. Charities and charitable incorporated organisations (CIOs) that are registered with the Charity Commission and operate mainly in England and Wales are eligible to apply.</p>
Grant amount:	<p>Successful applicants will receive:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two-year unrestricted grants of £50,000 • Support from the Foundation’s regional managers who will work with them to access a wide range of organisational development support to help meet identified needs.
Application process:	<p>The first step in the application process is to read the eligibility criteria and then complete the short eligibility checker, both of which are available on the Foundation's website.</p>
Deadline:	<p>Applications can be submitted at any time as there are no closing dates.</p>

Aims/priorities:

This Foundation awards grants in the following areas:

- Alcohol and substance misuse - projects supporting people affected by drug and/or alcohol misuse, and their families.
- People with disabilities - projects providing services for people with physical and/or learning disabilities, and/or for people with mental health issues.
- Disadvantaged minority communities - projects that work with minority communities facing both disadvantage (eg economic or cultural) and discrimination (eg due to ethnicity, sexuality, faith) to promote integration into mainstream society by providing:
 - Specialist services.
 - Access to mainstream services.
- Disadvantaged young people - projects which support disadvantaged young people, particularly (but not restricted to) those in or leaving care, or not in employment, education or training (NEET).
- Domestic and sexual abuse - projects supporting people affected by domestic or sexual abuse.
- Older people - projects providing services for older people, in particular people living in areas of high deprivation and where rural isolation is an issue.
- Homelessness - projects providing services for people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.
- Prisoners and ex-offenders - projects supporting prisoners and/or ex-offenders, or those at risk of offending, and their families.
- Visual impairment - projects providing services for blind or visually impaired people.

	<p>NB At least 50% of an applying organisation's service users benefiting from the capital project must be from one or more of the above groups.</p> <p>Funding is available for capital costs. This means tangible items or work, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Buildings - purchase, construction, renovation and/or refurbishment. • Fittings, fixtures, and equipment - this includes but is not limited to office equipment/furniture, sports/gym equipment, digital/audio visual equipment, garden equipment, specialist therapeutic (excluding medical) equipment. • Vehicles - minibus, car, caravan, people-carrier, 4X4. The Foundation is unlikely to fund the total cost of a new vehicle.
Who can apply?	UK registered charities, community interest companies, and other registered UK not-for-profit organisations (including special schools) with an annual income under £15 million can apply.
Grant amount:	<p>Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees who will determine what level of grant they will give.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For larger projects (£100,000+), the Foundation generally funds 10% or more of the balance to be raised. For example, if the project cost was £200,000 and the applicant had £150,000 left to raise, the grant award would be at least £15,000. The larger a project, the larger the grant is likely to be. • For smaller projects (with a balance of less than £10,000), the Foundation generally funds between 50% and 100% of the balance.
Application process:	Applicants must first complete an online eligibility quiz to get access to an online application form.

Aims/priorities:	<p>BBC Children in Need's focus is firmly on children and young people experiencing disadvantage. They fund organisations working to combat this disadvantage and to make a real difference to children and young people's lives. Applicants must be able to state why they are best placed to make a difference to the lives of disadvantaged children and young people, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Their well-established links with young people. • The skills and expertise they have for the work they are requesting funding for. • Their track record delivering the work they are requesting funding for. This is especially important for applicants for the Main Grants Programme. • How they work alongside other organisations in their local community. 	
Who can apply?	Registered not-for-profit organisations who work with disadvantaged children and young people of 18 years and under living in the UK.	
Grant amount:	<p>Grants of over £10,000 per year are available to support projects for up to three years. The average grant is likely to be around £30,000 per year.</p> <p>Applications cannot be made for more than £40,000 per year. It is highly unlikely that grants exceeding £100,000 in total for three years will be awarded.</p>

Aims/priorities:	<p>Funding is available to organisations that are supporting children and young people of 18 years and under who are experiencing disadvantage through:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Illness, distress, abuse or neglect. • Any kind of disability. • Behavioural or psychological difficulties. • Living in poverty or situations of deprivation. <p>Organisations must be working to combat this disadvantage and to make a real difference to children and young people's lives. Eligible projects will make these differences by either working directly with children or seeking to improve their social and physical environments.</p> <p>Priority will be given to projects where a relatively small amount of money can make a big difference for children and young people.</p>
Who can apply?	Registered not-for-profit organisations who work with disadvantaged children and young people of 18 years and under living in the UK.
Grant amount:	Grants of up to £10,000 are available per year for up to three years (£30,000 total request).

The panel looks for strong evidence of how closely applicants consult young people in developing their service, and for any community involvement or local financial support.</p>	
Who can apply?	Applications will be accepted from organisations with charitable aims. Groups do not have to be a registered charity to apply.	
Grant amount:	The average grant is £3,500

<p>Community Ownership Fund</p>	 <p>Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government</p>
<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>The Community Ownership Fund is a £150 million fund over 4 years to support community groups across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland to take ownership of assets which are at risk of being lost to the community.</p> <p>The Community Ownership Fund has 4 strategic objectives:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • provide targeted investment for communities to save community assets that would otherwise be lost • strengthen capacity and capability in communities to support them to shape their places and develop sustainable community businesses • empower communities in left behind places to level up • strengthen direct links between places across the UK and the UK government <p>All applicants must demonstrate the potential of their projects to deliver against all of the following outcomes:protect a community asset or amenity that is at risk and preserve its community value</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • develop a sustainable operating model to secure the long-term future of the community asset in community ownership • safeguard the use of community assets and associated local amenities <p>All applicants must also show how their project will help deliver one or more of the following outcomes for their place:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • increase feelings of pride and improve perceptions of the local area as a place to live • improve social trust, cohesion and sense of belonging

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • increase local participation in community life, arts and culture and/or sport • create additional local economic outcomes – including creating jobs, volunteering opportunities and improving employability and skills levels in the local community • create additional social and wellbeing outcomes – including delivering positive impact in physical and/or mental health and reducing loneliness and social isolation
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>The legal structures of organisations across the United Kingdom we might expect to apply include the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO) • Scottish charitable incorporated organisation (SCIO) • co-operatives including Community Benefit Societies • community Interest Company (CiC) • not-for-profit company limited by guarantee <p>To be eligible for funding, applicants will also have to demonstrate they are accountable to the local place and/or community they represent, how they will operate for the benefit of the wider community in tangible ways, and how they will use the asset to deliver community impact. Profits from the community asset and businesses should be reinvested in the asset to deliver community benefit.</p>
<p>Grant amount:</p>	<p>Applicants can apply for a blend of the following funding:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • capital funding to take ownership (including the acquisition of the building; refurbishment costs alongside a sale or a transfer). Up to £250,000 match-funded capital will be available for most asset types. Exceptionally bidders will be able to make the case for up to £1 million match-funding to help establish a community-owned sports club or help buy a sports club or ground at risk of being lost without community intervention • funding for project development - this might include professional fees for technical advice from architects or surveyors or legal advice. It might also include costs for

	<p>project management to oversee capital works where this is part of an application</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> post-acquisition support funding for up to the first year of operation, where there is a convincing case that this will help support a sustainable business model in the long term <p>Up to £50,000 (and no more than 20% of the total capital costs applied for through the Fund) is available for project development costs and post-acquisition support.</p>
Application process:	<p>A full guidance document for applicants is published on GOV.UK. The online portal for applications will open on 30 July 2021. A full application template is published at gov.uk. Applicants should use the template and guidance document to prepare all the information required for their application, prior to submitting via the online portal from 30 July 2021.</p>

**Culture Recovery Fund for Heritage -

Aims/priorities:	<p>These small grants are intended to help not-for-profit community organisations providing sport and physical activity, respond to the immediate challenges of returning to play in a coronavirus-safe way, as well as providing new activities to get people active again as restrictions are lifted.</p> <p>The funding can cover a wide range of costs and items specifically linking to returning to play during the coronavirus pandemic. Sport England has adopted a flexible approach on the types of projects it will support.</p>

The following are some examples of what can be funded:

Minor facility alterations

- Reconfiguration/refurbishment to meet social distancing requirements
- Changes required to adhere to published government guidance
- Other coronavirus-related adaptations, repairs and modifications, eg safety screening and contactless payment systems.

Service alterations

- Volunteer training, eg health and safety requirements, risk assessments, etc.
- Additional coaching/facility hire costs as a direct result of having to deliver to smaller group sizes
- New ways of delivering activity for existing participants/members. This could be purchasing licenses to use online technology having had to change from delivery in a studio to now having to deliver online, where the classes already existed prior to coronavirus.

Operational alterations

- Signage/floor markings – maintaining social distance and avoiding congestion
- Pre-visit guidance/marketing/communications – promoting good hygiene
- Cleaning/hygiene – keeping facilities and equipment clean
- Additional sports equipment/kit – minimising sharing.

New/additional activity

- Activity that provides opportunities to people who do not wish to return to previously delivered activity.
- An organisation offering a new or additional activity to respond to demand, due to changing habits of participants.

Feminist Review Trust	
Aims/priorities:	<p>The Trust aims to support projects in the UK and internationally that transform the lives of women.</p> <p>The Trust will fund the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Hard to fund projects: typically these projects have no other obvious sources of funding. This might mean, for example, that traditional academic sources are either not interested in the area or that it is an activist project or that it is too feminist for most conventional funding sources. For example the Trust supported the writing and publication of the history of Rape Crisis in Scotland and the translation and updating sections of 'Women and Their Bodies' into Arabic and Hebrew. Pump priming activities: the Trust will provide a small amount of funding to help start an activity in the hope that it will then be able attract sufficient funding to continue. For

example the Trust funded a project in Argentina to strengthen the capacity of organisations promoting women's rights and a project to provide audio visual equipment for a feminist social centre in Madrid. In each case these projects have hopefully helped to create a sustainable activity.

- Interventionist projects: the Trust will fund projects that support feminist values. It is often difficult for projects around core feminist concerns such as abortion rights and domestic violence to find funding. The Trust has supported, for example, Asylum Aid (an independent charity workshop with asylum seekers in the UK) to promote its 'Charter of Rights' for Women Seeking Asylum. The Trust has also supported the 40th Anniversary Campaign of Abortion Rights in the UK, a documentary about abortion in Trinidad and Tobago and a feminist art studio in Tbilisi, Georgia.
- Training and development projects: funding for projects which provide training in relevant areas. For example the Trust has funded English lessons for sex workers in London, leadership skills training for women in the voluntary sector and volunteer training at Glasgow Women's Library.
- One-off events: the Trust supported Cine25 as part of the celebrations of 25 years of Women's Studies at the University of York (UK), a seminar for the Lileth Project (a violence against women housing related project), and a workshop on the gender dimensions of Bulgarian Immigration Policy.
- Dissemination: the Trust will fund the production and distribution of relevant material. Too often work has had a more limited impact than it should because it was not well distributed. For example the Trust has supported the production of a booklet on Asian women's experiences of higher education in the UK and the distribution of

	<p>publications by the Rights of Women (a non-profit UK group).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Core funding: the Trust realises that many groups struggle to raise core funding. The Trustees are willing to offer core funding to cover staff costs, accommodation etc. • Other projects: the Trust may still support an application that does not easily fit into any of the above categories. For example the Trust has funded a project to capture oral histories of women's experience of the menopause. Applicants should contact the Trust to discuss eligibility prior to submitting an application. • Where projects include a research element, applicants should describe the steps that have been taken to ensure the research will be undertaken in an ethical manner and careful attention should be paid to the costs.
Who can apply?	Individuals and organisations in the UK and internationally are eligible to apply.
Grant amount:	Grants of up to £15,000 are available. However, the Trustees rarely give out awards of this amount. The Trust receives a very large number of applications; far more than it can fund. The current success rate for applications is 1–2%.
