The Foundation:

- Welcomes applications that aim to engage and inspire young people and adults to take an interest in science.
- Looks for imaginative proposals that will in some way make the North West a richer and more attractive place in which to live and work.

	The Foundation appreciates so many have had to adapt to new
	ways of working to deliver their projects and the creative new
	platforms that have been found to engage with audiences and
	communities has been inspiring. The Foundation have always
	welcomed innovative new projects and intend to continue this
	tradition to encourage forward thinking applications and support
	successful applicants however they envisage delivery. It will
	positively encourage bids from organisations whose projects will
	not only help to culturally support communities in its region but
	also support creative talent so badly impacted by the necessary
	restrictions.
Who can apply?	Organisations in the North West of England are eligible to apply.

	but the Foundation occasionally considers applications from not-

Grant amount:	Grants of £500 up to £15,000 are available. Currently, the
	average grant awarded is £2,000.
	Larger grants can be awarded if the project is felt to be
	particularly innovative and imaginative and have a strong artistic
	or scientific content.
	The Foundation will not be sole funders of any project and
	applicants should not expect 100% of funding unless there are
	exceptional circumstances. Applicants are expected to
	demonstrate that they are seeking funding from other sources.

The Trust is aware that traditional performance-based projects will be impracticable for the foreseeable future. However, many organisations are finding creative new ways to reach their audiences or to reach altogether new audiences. For the forthcoming round of applications the Trustees wish to support such innovative and imaginative projects developed in response to the current challenging times.

Under Music Grants, funding is not available for operating costs, competitions and capital projects.

Heritage & Crafts Grants

The Trust supports the development of the skills, knowledge and experience that underpin the UK's traditional cultural heritage and crafts sectors. This includes support for craft and conservation training, for practical projects, particularly those that include

- A strong training element.
- Strategic and capacity-building projects which demonstrate clear benefits to the sector.
- Special Needs projects whose emphasis is on skills development.

However, the Trust will consider other projects, should they fall broadly within its remit. The Trust wishes to promote standards of excellence through all its support.

Under Heritage & Crafts Grants, funding is not available for conference fees or associated costs, projects that are solely or primarily about nature conservation, and projects that are primarily social or therapeutic in nature.

Who can apply?

Registered charities that are based in the UK are eligible to apply.

For the Main Grants Programme, applications are considered for both one-off short term projects and for projects lasting up to three years. Support is available for the costs an organisation incurs in delivering a particular time limited project. This could include research and development, piloting a new idea or developing the scope or scale of an existing project or previous pilot. A small contribution to core costs or existing staff posts specific to project delivery may be available. Applicants should demonstrate that the funding will make a considerable impact.

For the Small Grants Programme, applications are considered for innovative, small projects, pilots, or research and development to inform a new project or programme of work. This fund aims to support practitioners to take risks, push boundaries, invent, develop new methodologies and explorations. New and existing projects are eligible.

Who can apply?

Not-for-profit organisations based in the UK are eligible to apply.

Although most applicants will be an arts organisation, other organisations which intend to partner with arts organisations or work with artists within the project will be considered.

Grant amount:

There are two strands to the Open Grants Scheme:

 Main Grants of between £5,000 and £20,000 are available for projects lasting up to three years. Applications of up to £50,000 for multi-year projects from organisations with appropriate experience will be considered. A minimum of

	 20% match funding is required. Between 30% and 80% of the total project costs are likely to be funded. Small Grants of up to £1,500 are available. No match funding is required but if funding is available from another
	source, this should be no more than £500.

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GENERAL

Aims/priorities: The aim of the foundation is to help raise the quality of life in England and Wales, particularly for the young, disadvantaged and older people. Community The Trustees consider applications for two main themes under this category with the aim of creating cohesive and positive communities. Firstly, the Trustees are strong believers that every community needs a focus on which to build the cohesion of that community. They are therefore advocates of the 'village hall', particularly in

isolated rural areas where facilities are often very limited.

Support is available for church halls, churches or other buildings providing there is strong evidence that a high proportion of secular activities (ie no connection at all with religion or spirituality) accessible to the whole community take place.

Conservation and heritage projects for halls/churches are not generally supported.

Secondly, the Trustees aim to provide practical activities that help young people attain their full potential and take their place within society as responsible citizens. To this end, they support Youth Activity Centres, uniformed youth groups and youth clubs. They also help those who are young ex-offenders, 'at risk' or in danger of exclusion.

Education

The Trustees focus on assisting those with special educational and learning needs. Support is available for educational nature and farm visitor centres but not for projects in mainstream schools or universities.

Health

The Trustees' interests focus on building projects for residential care housing and treatment centres, and the provision of major equipment (not consumables) to enhance medical treatment and care.

Social Welfare

Applications for capital projects are considered by Trustees ranging from residential housing for the homeless to 'day centres' providing support, training and education facilities.

Trustees also support the welfare needs of those who serve or have served in the Armed Forces and their families, particularly ex-service men and women with health and mental issues
