We have money to invest in your active ideas! Your group can apply for the Use Your Energy funding to make your active idea a reality. There are currently three tiers of grants that are available:</p> <p>Use Your Energy 500 - Get that idea off the ground.</p> <p>We are looking for new groups or enthusiastic individuals who have an idea in getting young people who are not currently active, more active, and need support in getting the idea off the ground.</p>

Underpinned by the mission 'To make a positive difference in the communities we serve' groups can bid for up to £2,500 for their neighbourhood. The fund aims to support projects which prevent, reuse, or recycle household waste, and also reduce contamination, promote sustainable use	

	of waste and resources, and generate wider social benefits for the communities of Greater Manchester.

Benefact Trust – Brighter Lives Mental Health Programme	 <p>BENEFACT TRUST</p>
Aims/priorities:	Benefact Trust (formerly known as Allchurches Trust) is offering grants to Christian charities and organisations throughout the United Kingdom and Ireland to provide increased mental health support for people and communities in need regardless of faith. The Brighter Lives Mental Health Programme will enable Christian churches, cathedrals, denominational bodies, and charities to respond to the mental health crisis exacerbated by COVID-19 through greater training, resources, and support.
