LOCAL

Rapid ROCA

Aims/priorities: First Choice Homes Oldham (FCHO) and partners are releasing more funding for Rapid ROCA looking for projects that 'most benefit' the community. Applicants will be considered against other applications.

Who can apply? Community groups with an annual income less than £20k based in Oldham. Applicants will ideally already have a committee of members and a bank account in place but start-up projects that don't will not be turned away. Applicants who have previously been successful with ROCA funding are eligible to apply however priority will be given to new groups. Groups must be Oldham based and benefit communities in the area. Statutory organisations are not eligible to apply.

Grant amount: Up to £500

Application process: Groups need to attend a drop-in session where staff will be available to lead you through the process. Please come prepared with your project idea and costings for what you want Rapid ROCA to fund.

Tameside Community Wellbeing Investments

Aims/priorities: Supporting good ideas that meet the following Community Wellbeing Investment Priorities:



- Improve wellbeing, and health of people with long term health conditions.
- Reduce social isolation (lack of contact with people and society).
- Reduce loneliness (emotional response to a lack of connection or communication with people).
- Create mutually beneficial networks of support and resilience (including carers).
- Support people with low mood, low self-esteem / loss of confidence.
- Support place-based working that improves lives in local communities.

Who can apply? This investment is open to all local VCFSE groups that are members of Action Together CIO (becoming a member is simple, free and support is available to help you).

Grant amount: Groups can apply for different tiers of investment, up to £10,000 and between £10,000 and £25,000 by application, as well as larger awards for areas of support we identify and Participatory Budgeting opportunities later in the year. The investment monies available will be just over £1million over the next 2 years.

left most of his estate to the foundation, creating one of the largest independent grant-making

Who can apply? The current UK strategy for the foundation works around six priorities, these are:

- We want to show that the arts make a difference to people's lives.
- We want to support the development and growth of organisations investing in young people and positive change.

CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

Kellogg's Breakfast Club Grants Programme

Aims/priorities: Kellogg's has teamed up with Forever Manchester to award grants to school Breakfast Clubs, to help them provide breakfast to those children who need it most.

Who can apply? Your breakfast club must be based in a school in England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland. Priority will be given to schools that have either:

35% and above of children eligible for pupil premium funding and/or eligible for free school meals

OR Schools that are based in an area which is classified as falling in the 10% of most deprived areas according to the index of Multiple Deprivation. Additionally, if your school has received breakfast club funding from Gregg's or Magic Breakfast within the current academic year, your club will not be considered a priority for support. Only one grant per school in each academic year is available.



Grant amount: £1,000

St. James Place Charitable Foundation

Aims/Priorities: Since its formation in 1992, the Charitable Foundation has aimed to make a positive and lasting change to the lives of children and young people. Supporting young people is still our largest focus area, although today our work stretches across three main themes:

- Supporting Young People – Special Needs/Disadvantaged (aged up to 25 years)
- Combatting cancer (all ages)
- Supporting hospices (all ages)

Approximately 80% of the money raised goes to supporting UK charities, with the remaining 20% being allocated to charities overseas, particularly those helping children and young people to escape poverty, malnutrition and neglect. The Overseas grants programme is open via invitation only through the St. James's Place Community.

Who can apply? We work with charities who support disadvantaged and disabled young people under the age of 25 in a number of areas, including:

- Young people with physical or mental health difficulties or life threatening or degenerative conditions
- Young carers
- Young people who are socially or economically disadvantaged

Grant amount: We offer small grants of up to £10,000 to UK Registered Charities with an annual income of up to £1,000,000 (this income restriction does not apply to Special Needs Schools or Mainstream Schools with a Special Needs Unit).

Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust

Aims/priorities: The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust award grants to projects that address specific categories set out by the trust each year. The category for 2019 is Children and Young People. Some of the other focuses of the trust are Arts & Culture, Community, Health & Social Care and Older People. Grants are awarded four times per year.



Who can apply? The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust gives grants to registered charities that work in the UK. In 2019, priority is being given to projects focusing on child exploitation, mentoring and support and clubs & activities. We will also prioritise awarding grants to projects that address mental health. To apply for this grant you must meet the following criteria:

- Your project must relate to children aged between 0 and 11.
- Your charity's operating income and operating expenditure must be a minimum of £100,000 and a maximum of £1,000,000.

Magdalen Hospital Trust

Aims/priorities: The Trust offers grants to promote the welfare of young people, under the age of 25 years, who suffer from various effects of social deprivation, abuse, mental and physical handicap, inadequate housing, lack of education or training, and the problems derived from unemployment and broken families. The Trust prefers to fund project costs rather than core costs. Funding is available for the following:

- Projects that provide training for work and personal development.
- Clubs.

- Crime prevention.
- Emergency care.
- Play schemes.
- Mental health support and counselling.

Who can apply? Charities registered in the UK with an annual income of less than £150,000 can apply. 'The preferred area of works of work are small community groups, with an element of trained volunteers, and self-help, who are carrying out practical work in front line situations.'

Grant amount: Grants tend to range from £500 to £2,000.

Aims/Priorities: The Bright ideas fund supports new community business ideas through the start-up and planning stages with tailored business support up to the implementation stage. The Bright Ideas fund is funded by Power to Change, the independent trust supporting community business in England, and delivered by Locality, the national network for community organisations, in partnership with Cooperatives UK, the Plunkett Foundation and Groundwork UK.



Who can apply? To be eligible to apply for the Bright Ideas Fund you must:

- Be setting up a community business
- Be based in England
- Be an incorporated or unincorporated organisation, but not an individual
- Have been established for five years or less
- Have a charitable purpose
- Ensure your idea is for community benefit
- Share Power to Change's impact goals
- Make your community business accessible and inclusive

Trusthouse Charitable Foundation

Aims/priorities: Trusthouse gives grants for running costs or one-off capital costs to charities and not-for-profit organisations in accordance with criteria that are

regularly reviewed and decided by the trustees. Our overarching themes are Rural Issues and Urban Deprivation. Within these overarching themes we are interested in two areas: Community Support and Arts, Education and Heritage.

Who can apply? Our focus is on supporting smaller charitable and not-for-profit organisations within the UK, with a total annual income under £500,000, who work in the most deprived urban areas or the most remote and socio-economically deprived rural areas.

Grant Amount: Major Grants Programme – Open to any eligible organisation with a total annual income under £500,000. Single year grants are available between £7,500 and £20,000. Multi-year grants are available between £7,500 and £20,000 per annum.

W F Southall Trust

Aims/priorities: The W F Southall Trust is a Quaker-based family-run grant making charitable trust. The trust awards grants to charities that are registered in the UK. Typically, these charities will be working in at least one of the following four fields:



- Quaker Work and Witness
- Environmental Action & Sustainability
- Peace & Reconciliation
- Social Action

Who can apply? Projects that encourage wider support of the categories listed above. Projects where grants of between £1,000 and £3,000 will make a quantifiable difference. Grassroots initiatives are looked on favourably.

Grant amount: Most grants are between £1,000 and £3,000. However, a handful of larger grants are awarded each year, but these are usually reserved for Quaker-based causes.

Deadline: No application deadlines and charities can apply at any time during the year. However, requests for more than £3,000 must be assessed by a trustee sub-group before going for a full trustee meeting. At present, these larger grants are only considered at our March and November meetings. Sub groups meet roughly every two to three months.

Aims/priorities: The Small Appeals Programme is administered and provided by the Rank Foundation.



Funding is available for charities and churches for

projects that benefit UK residents in UK communities. This fund is aimed at smaller charities that may not be covered by the Rank Foundation’s larger programmes.

Funding is available for:

- A particular project for which the mainstay is capital costs - building work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment.
- A one-off short term activity, such as an annual respite break or holiday for disadvantaged young people.

Please be aware that the Trustees are only able to make a contribution to the project costs through this funding scheme. We therefore require that you have already raised a third of the total costs to ensure that the project will go ahead with our contribution.

Who can apply: Registered charities with an annual income of less than £500,000.

Grant amount? No maximum amount stated as this is dependent on the number of applications received. The most commonly donated amount is £1000. The Rank Foundation will only consider one application per year.

LGBT + Futures Fund Small Grants Programme

Aims/priorities: The LGBT Consortium is working with the Government Equalities Office (GEO) to setup, manage and distribute small grants to LGBT+ organisations across England.

The funding available will look to fund locally based

interventions that support and increase the visibility of diverse

LGBT+ people & communities, those focussed on sustainability, and those that address the findings of the GEO's National LGBT Survey.



Who can apply? Any non-profit organisation whose primary focus is Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trans + (LGBT +) communities is welcome to apply. We recognize that some organisations will only focus on part of those communities. Applicants do not need to be a member of the LGBT consortium. Organisations will need to have some form of governance structure and have good finance practice in place.

Grant Amount: There will be three types of grants awarded throughout this programme:

- Events (£500-£15,000)
- Projects (£500-£15,000)
- Organisational Sustainability (£500-£20,000)

We will expect funding requests to be relative to the size of the organisation and the funding proposals. We strongly encourage applicants not to apply for the full amount just because it is there. The average grant award is likely to be much lower than the maximum. For reference, we are looking to distribute up to £200,000 in this first round of grants.
