**Tameside Community Wellbeing Alliance –  
Microgrants**



**Aims/priorities:**

The Community Wellbeing Alliance aims to bring together people who live in Tameside with people who deliver services here. It will act as a central point for people to learn from each other. We will develop and share a simple message to champion the role people have in their own health and wellbeing. The priorities of the grant are:

1) Engage local people in ‘Community Conversations’ about their wellbeing through activities, using creative and safe ways to engage with people so we can share what we know is out there to support their wellbeing with people that may not have seen it. This can include, but is not limited to:

- Projects that bring local partners together to engage creatively with residents and each other
- Use existing relationships with people to support them to take control of their health and wellbeing
- Encourage people to increase their knowledge and understanding of how to improve wellbeing for themselves, their families, and their friends

2) Help vulnerable people and communities through the Covid-19 pandemic, supporting people affected by the crisis and using approaches which tackle the new and emerging barriers arising from the impact of coronavirus.

<p><b>Food for Life Get Togethers – Small Grants</b></p>	
<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The Food for Life Get Togethers Small Grants scheme is provided with funding by the National Lottery Community Fund and administered by the Soil Association. The funding is intended for gatherings and events that connect different age groups together and represent diverse communities.</p> <p>There is a particular focus on awarding grants to groups and organisations in the Food for Life Get Togethers ‘test and learn regions’ who may experience social and economic disadvantage.</p> <p>The funding is to help groups host a good food Get Together in their community that bring people of different backgrounds and/or ages together to strengthen and connect communities through one or more of food growing, cooking and food sharing.</p> <p>The funding is for food-based community projects that are virtual or take place online:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have potential to be long term.</li> <li>• Are community led.</li> <li>• Include people from disadvantaged and diverse communities.</li> <li>• Bring people together.</li> <li>• Reduce experience of loneliness or social isolation.</li> <li>• Encourage a positive attitude to ageing and diversity.</li> </ul>

	The funding can be used either for activity costs (for example, seeds, transport, technology, food etc.) or equipment (for example, induction hobs, fridges, durable gardening tools, etc.).
<b>Who can apply?</b>	<p>Applications will be considered from not-for-profit settings including, but not limited to local community groups, nurseries, schools, care homes, community health and social care settings, housing associations, and charities.</p> <p>Community groups must have a bank account in the group's name.</p> <p>Applications are currently being accepted from the Rochdale area.</p>

<b>Aims/priorities:</b>	Grants are available for not-for-profit theatres in the UK for capital improvement projects that will improve environmental sustainability. Grants can be used for capital costs of building or equipment. The theme for applications is Improving Environmental Sustainability. Funding will be given to projects that demonstrate how a small intervention can have a big impact on reducing the theatre's environmental impact.
