COVID-19

Emergency Grants for Greater Manchester BAME Communities

Aims/priorities: The funding for the scheme is provided by Comic Relief and the National Emergency Fund. The GM BAME Network and the Greater Manchester Centre for Voluntary Organisation (GMCVO) are administering the scheme.

The aim of the scheme is to support BAME led organisations in Greater Manchester by funding new activities and services as well as the additional costs of adapting existing services due to the coronavirus/COVID-19. The funding will also help counter the loss of fundraising income directly caused by the pandemic.

Who can apply? Grants are available for small BAME-led VCSE organisations in Greater Manchester affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, to enable them to respond to the needs of BAME communities.

Grant amount: Two levels of funding are available:

- Micro Grants of between £50 and £1,000.
- Small Grants of between £1,000 and £5,000.

Organisations can apply for both a Micro and Small Grant.

Application process: Guidelines are available on the website of GMCVO. Applications should be completed online, through the GMCVO grants portal. Organisations will need to register on the portal first before they can apply.

Deadline: Micro grants- ongoing. Small Grants – 16 February 2021 at 4pm

National Lottery - Local Connections Fund

Aims/priorities: The Local Connections Fund is a new £4 million fund to help charities and community groups in England that are working to reduce loneliness by helping them build connections across their communities.



The funding will help to bring people together in safe and secure ways – including by covering the costs of technologies and equipment that will help people feel more connected within their communities.

Who can apply? Small, local organisations (with an annual income of £50,000 or less. Organisations can still apply, even if they already have existing grants with The National Lottery Community Fund.

Grant amount: Between £300 and £2,500

Application process: Successful applicants for this round (there will be two rounds) of funding must have spent the money and finished their project by 31 March 2021.

Oldham Community Recovery Fund

Aims/priorities: Applications for Oldham's Community Recovery Fund should be for projects that meet one or more of the following priorities:

- Encouraging fit and healthy people and communities
- Developing people's skills
- Changing your local area for the better
- Encouraging people to get involved in their community and social action
- Protecting those who are vulnerable and those who are victims of crime or at risk of being victimised, including domestic abuse.
- Building resilience, feelings of safety and confidence in community safety.
- Preventing anti-social and criminal behaviour in Oldham
- Helping to build resilient and resourceful communities in Oldham including online communities and protecting the places where people live, work, socialise or travel.



The fund has contributions from Thriving Communities and Community Safety & Cohesion Partnership and OHIP

Who can apply? Voluntary, community, faith and social enterprise (VCFSE) groups working in the borough of Oldham

Grant amount: You can apply for a grant up to:

- £1,000 if you are formally constituted and are a member or [become a member](#) of Action Together; or
- £200 if you are an informal social action or mutual aid activity.

Please note:

- Mutual Aid is the term we use to describe people giving each other needed support in communities.
- Social Action is the term we use to describe people coming together (physically or remotely) to help solve the problems that are important in their communities.

Oldham – Let's End Hate Crime

Aims/priorities: Hate crime is significantly under-reported. Even in difficult times, continued efforts by local groups and organisations are needed to raise awareness of and challenge hate crime in our communities and to help instil confidence in victims by highlighting how and where hate crime incidents can be reported. Organisations must engage local people beyond their existing membership networks and should be

- Holding an awareness raising activity or public event during the Greater Manchester Hate Crime Week taking place 1-7th February 2021
- Delivering a longer term project to help local people find out more about hate crime. These will be launched during Hate Crime Awareness Week and be completed by December 2021 or
- Encouraging more victims to report hate crimes to either the Police or third-party reporting centres across the Borough.

Applications submitted to this programme must fit with the government's coronavirus social-distancing measures and include careful consideration of the safety both of those delivering the activity and its intended audience.

Priority will be given to innovative projects which show an awareness of more than one strand of hate crime and projects which can show a tangible product at the end that can then be re-used e.g. hate crime awareness resources such as posters, film clips, music, artwork, presentation materials and research documents and findings etc.

Who can apply? To be eligible a group must be a member of Action Together based in the Oldham Borough and engaging with local people beyond their existing membership networks

Grant amount: There is upto £1,000 per project available. The funding pot totals £5,000, meaning approximately five grants are available in all.

GM Moving Oldham Local Pilot

Aims/priorities: The Oldham Local Pilot

Investment Grant's support local projects which will contribute to increasing physical activity. We are

open to any ideas for all groups across Oldham, but priority will be given to activities which involve:

- People in Failsworth and Glodwick (as selected 'Local Pilot' areas)
- Children & Young People aged 5-18 in out of school settings
- People out of work/at risk of becoming workless
- People aged 40-60 with, or at risk of, long term conditions like cancer, cardiovascular disease and respiratory disorders

Who can apply? Any group can apply if you have an activity which might contribute to the above aims. This includes unconstituted groups if we can identify other ways to be sure the funding you receive will be spent on the aims above.

Grant amount: Micro grants are available for amounts up to £1000 on a rolling programme.



Larger grants up to £5,000 are available for decision through community-wide 'Participatory Budgeting' event, as well as up to £25,000 for ideas that have been developed alongside the community as part of the wider Local Pilot work.

Rochdale Community Response Fund - Equalities Focus

Aims/priorities: We are particularly interested in funding work that helps, connects or supports groups of people who are experiencing inequalities caused or worsened by the pandemic.



Early emerging evidence has shown that some groups are more affected than others and we will prioritise applications that support one or more of these groups.

- Older people
- Black Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) groups
- People who live in low-income areas or vulnerable settings
- The impact of other 'co-morbidities' (other underlying diseases)

Who can apply? Groups and organisations from the Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise (VCFSE) sector.

Grant amount: You can apply for a grant for either up to £200 or up to £1,000.

Application process: Visit Action Together's website for application forms and guidance notes.

Places of Worship/Multipurpose Community Building Reopening Fund

Aims/priorities: This funding is available for Rochdale Borough groups who are working towards reopening their place of worship/multipurpose community building and ensuring

they can do so safely and following all of the recent government guidelines which have been released.

Your application must show that your project meets one or more of the below criteria to apply for

this fund:

- Making the place of worship/multipurpose community building safe - this could include help with risk assessments, additional cleaning, equipment, signage and setting up systems to collect personal data to support the NHS Test and Trace service.
- Engaging your community to raise awareness of the risk and symptoms of Coronavirus - this could include holding community engagement events/online webinars. Furthermore, overcoming barriers with those that are hard to engage and ensuring that they are aware of the local and national guidelines on how to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus
- Providing support in multiple languages - this could include educating the wider community on how to stay Covid-safe in their household, community or work place
- Training volunteers
 - to work with the local authority and public health to deliver outreach activities and educate the wider community and sign posting them to the appropriate support (e.g. how to get tested if a person develops Covid-19 symptoms)
- to engage with their community and identify risks and vulnerabilities which could have a detrimental impact on a family or community (e.g. unemployment, welfare support, mental health, dependencies, domestic abuse and other safeguarding vulnerabilities)

Who can apply? Rochdale Borough faith groups who are working towards reopening their place of worship and/or organisations reopening multipurpose community buildings. If a collective of places of worship/ community buildings would like to apply together for an amount above £1000 please contact kerry.bertram@actiontogether.org.uk prior to applying, for an initial conversation.

Grant amount: Grants of up to £1,000 are available

FASD Small Grants - Rochdale Borough

Aims/priorities: We want to work with voluntary, community and social enterprise (VCSE) groups and organisations in the local authority area of Rochdale to provide peer support opportunities for parents, carers and families of children with suspected or diagnosed Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). FASD is an umbrella term used to describe the range of lifelong disabilities that can occur as a result of drinking alcohol during pregnancy.

Applications must:

- Deliver a peer support activity or event that will take place at least once a month
- Be prepared to learn from those taking part and let them design and shape developing activities and events, and demonstrate how this is being done
- Take part in shared learning, mainly via email and phone, with the other projects funded.
- Be involved and with the FASD network and attend monthly meetings.

Who can apply? Voluntary, community and social enterprise groups and organisations in the area of Rochdale Borough can apply.

Grant Amount: Grants of up to £2000 are available

ARTS

Arts Council England National Lottery Projects Grants

Aims/priorities: This grants programme is intended to help the Arts Council achieve its mission of 'Great art and culture for everyone'. It also provides a means to support a broad range of not-for-profit projects that create and sustain quality work and help people across England to engage with arts and culture. The programme supports development by allowing artists, cultural practitioners and organisations to work in new ways and to get their work out to new audiences.

In response to the impact of the coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis on the sector, between July 2020 and April 2021 the programme will support individuals and organisations to get activities up and running again, and to help people take their first steps in getting re-engaged with culture and creativity.

Who can apply? The grants programme supports a broad range of creative and cultural projects that benefit people living in England. Projects can range from directly creating and delivering creative and cultural activity to projects which have a longer term positive impact, such as organisational development, research and development and sector support and development.

Because of the circumstances during the coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis, the programme will be particularly keen to support:

- Applications from individual creative practitioners (including time to think and plan).
- Research and development activity.
- Organisational development activity.
- Live activity that can be safely delivered within this period (rather than activity with a start date far in the future).
- Activity that closely aligns with the Arts Council's Equality Objectives.

Grant amount: Maximum Value: £ 100,000 - - Minimum Value: £ 1,000

Grants can support projects where the capital-specific expenditure in a project totals less than £100,000. This includes:

- Applications for capital work only, where that capital work will cost up to £100,000.
- Applications for a mix of activities that include some capital spending where the total cost of the capital work is less than £100,000.

Application process: Applications must meet the programme's four criteria: Quality, Public engagement, Finance and Management.

How to apply documents and supplementary guidance regarding the priorities and criteria that apply between July 2020 and April 2021 in light of the coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis are available on the Arts Council England website.

- Applications are made using Arts Council England's Grantium system.

Deadline:

- Applications for £15,000 or under will receive a decision in six weeks.
- Applications for more than £15,000 will receive a decision in 12 weeks.

Radcliffe Trust

Aims/priorities: The Radcliffe Trust supports classical music performance and training, especially chamber music, composition and music education.



THE RADCLIFFE TRUST

Particular interests within music education are music for children and adults with special needs, youth orchestras and projects at secondary and higher levels, including academic research.

The Trust also supports the development and practice of the skills, knowledge and experience that underpin the UK's heritage and crafts sector. This includes support for emerging craftspeople of high quality, craft and conservation projects and training, projects demonstrating creative outcomes by designer-makers, projects with potential for capacity building within the sector, and some special needs projects focusing on the therapeutic benefits of skills development.

Who can apply? Funding is available for UK registered charities working in the areas of music, especially chamber music, composition and music education, or in heritage and crafts.

Applications are normally considered under the following headings:

- Composition and contemporary music.
- Bursaries for courses and summer schools for UK based students.
- Music therapy/special needs.
- Academic research/projects.
- Youth orchestras.
- Performance projects.
- Educational projects.
- Miscellaneous.

Grant amount: Grants are generally in the region of £2,500 to £7,500.

Starting from June 2020, and for the foreseeable future, the Trust will only be making one year grants and will not consider multi-year funding.

Application process: The online application forms can be found on the Trust's website.

Deadline: There are normally two application deadlines per year.

CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

BBC Children in Need Main Grant and Small Grant Applications

Aims/priorities: All applications will have to show how this funding will make a difference to children and young people's lives during this crisis.



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the funder has temporarily broadened the types of applications it is accepting. Currently funding is being offered that can be used more flexibly than usual.

Applications are encouraged for:

- Project delivery (Including staffing and salary costs)
- Creative solutions to deliver much needed services
- Organisational costs to support stability and adaptation. (Including the day-to-day running costs of an organisation as opposed to specific project costs)

Applications are not limited to one specific project and a request can be made for organisational running costs. The funder is committed to supporting voluntary groups with these types of grants.

Who can apply? Registered not-for-profit organisations that work with disadvantaged children and young people of 18 years and under who live in the UK, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands.

Grant amount: Small grants: up to £10,000. Main grants: £10,001 - £40,000 per year for up to 3 years (but rarely more than £100,000 in total).

Application process: The application process requires that applicants register by submitting an Organisation Registration form. This only needs to be done once. Once registered, organisations will receive a link to fill in a Main Grants Project Application Form. This form can then be accessed through the online application portal.

Deadline: Applications will be accepted from 8 February 2021 to 18 March 2021 (11:30am) with decisions by the end of July 2021.

The next deadline for all applications is 11:30 am on 18 March 2021

Peter Kershaw Memorial Bursary

Aims/priorities: The broad purpose of the Trust is to provide grants to combat social disadvantage in the Greater Manchester.

The memorial bursary is an annual award made by the Trustees in memory of the Trust's benefactor. The bursary is intended to fund the costs of a youth leader, though other forms of youth work will be considered.

Who can apply? Registered charities operating in Greater Manchester can apply.

Grant amount: The bursary will be awarded on the basis of up to £25,000 for year 1, £15,000 for year 2 and £10,000 for year 3.

Priority will be given to organisations that can show a firm shared element of funding beyond year 1 and where the appointment creates new opportunities.

Application process: The application should take the form of a short reasoned statement and be accompanied by a detailed budget for the proposal and a copy of the organisation's latest audited accounts. All applications should be sent to the Secretary to the Trustees.

Bowland Charitable Trust

Aims/priorities: The programme is intended to promote:

BlueSpark Foundation

Aims/priorities: The BlueSpark Foundation is a registered charity whose objective is to fund or part-fund projects that aim to improve the education and development of children and young people by means of educational, cultural, sporting or other activities.

The funding is intended to support projects that have the following objectives:

- Encouraging independence.
- Developing team working skills.
- Enhancing self confidence.
- Promoting creativity and individuality.
- Encouraging aspiration.
- Enhancing educational achievement.
- Widening educational horizons.

The funding is for relatively small-scale projects, which might not happen at all or would only happen on a lesser scale without the support of BlueSpark.

Who can apply? Schools, community groups, clubs, societies and other not-for-profit organisations based and working in England can apply, as can individuals.

Grant amount: Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. Some grants awarded are under £2,000 and almost all are under £5,000.

The Trust expects that grants awarded for a particular project will constitute a significant proportion of the costs of that project rather than being marginally incremental to its funding. Grants will only be awarded for the amount requested in the application and will not be scaled back to a lesser amount.

David Wilson Homes North West - Our Space Your Place Grants

Aims/priorities: Provided by housebuilding company David Wilson Homes North West, which currently has developments in Warrington, Wigan, Sandbach, Nantwich, Silverdale, Rochdale and Liverpool, the Our Space Your Place grant scheme is an initiative that offers a small amount of funding each year to help improve and enhance local communities in the North West of England.

The scheme defines the North West as Cheshire, Greater Manchester, Staffordshire, Merseyside, Flintshire, Wrexham and Lancashire. Eligible projects could include providing a charitable service, enhancing the local environment or offering educational facilities.

Who can apply? Any companies and organisations, including community groups and charities, that are based in Cheshire, Greater Manchester, Staffordshire, Merseyside, Flintshire, Wrexham and Lancashire can apply.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- Have a bank or building society account.
- Be able to use the grant within four months of receiving it.
- Be willing to take part in any media or press activities that may take place.
- Have their registered office address or place of business in the North West of England.

Grant amount: Grants of up to £1,000 are available.

The Charity Service Grant Fund

Aims/priorities: Applications for grant funding are invited from registered charities, CICs and voluntary organisations who work with disadvantaged communities and/or individuals living within the Greater Manchester area.

We welcome applications for all charitable purposes however due to the ongoing situation with the pandemic we want to focus our support on 4 priority areas – preventing homelessness, reducing social isolation, improving access to employment and emergency support for vulnerable families and children.

Who can apply? Registered charities, community interest companies (CICs) and voluntary organisations are welcome to apply. Multiple applications from one organisation will be considered although these must not be for the same purpose. We would not normally fund an organisation that has been registered for less than 3 years.

Grant amount: Our average grant award is £1,000. Larger grants, maximum of £3000, may be considered in exceptional circumstances.

National Lottery Community Fund - Partnerships

Aims/priorities: The aim of the programme is to encourage organisations to work in partnership to help their communities thrive by focusing on the bigger picture, rather than

just what their organisation can do on its own. “Communities” can be people living in the same area, or people with similar interests or life experiences.

During the ongoing coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic, the Partnerships programme is supporting people and communities most adversely impacted by the crisis.

Organisations and their partners can apply for funding to:

- Continue to deliver activity, whether they are supporting existing users, responding to the immediate crisis or undertaking recovery activity.
- Change and adapt, becoming more resilient in order to respond to new and future challenges.

Activities should support communities to thrive, by:

- Building strong relationships in and across communities.
- Improving the places and spaces that matter to communities.
- Helping more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage.

To be eligible for funding activities should:

- Involve people and communities from the start.
- Build on people’s strengths.
- Be connected in their community.

Who can apply? Applications will be accepted from partnerships (both new and existing) of any of the following organisations:

AHF Transforming Places Through Heritage Programme - Project Viability Grants

Aims/priorities: The funding is intended for non-profit organisations to support the development of projects that have the potential to bring new life to high streets by creating alternative uses for redundant or underused historic buildings in town centres. Funding can be used for individual heritage buildings in, or transferring to, community ownership or that of charitable/social enterprise organisations.

Project viability grants of up to £15,000 are available for up to 100% of the cost of work involved.

At least 100 individual projects will be supported across all funding areas of the Transforming Places Through Heritage programme. The majority of funding will be awarded for project viability grants and project development grants.

There is an overall limit of £150,000 on the total funding available for developing any one project. Organisations can only apply to one grant category at any one time but may apply for further grants on completion of the funded work (subject to the overall limit).

- Project Development Grants: up to £100,000, for capital project development costs (covered separately).
- Crowdfunding Challenge Grants: up to £25,000, to match fund crowdfunding campaigns (covered separately).
- Transformational Project Grants: up to £350,000, for transformational capital projects (covered separately).
- Community Shares Booster Grants: development grants up to £10,000 and equity investments up to £50,000 for Community Benefit Societies and Cooperatives. This grant programme is being managed by Co-Operatives UK on behalf of AHF. (Once launched, it will be covered separately).

Get Fishing Fund

Who can apply? Applications are accepted from angling clubs, fisheries, charities, schools and local authorities in England that want to increase the number of people being introduced to angling.

Activity that is delivered as a result of receiving funding must be delivered on freshwater fisheries where angling requires a fishing licence.

Grant amount: Organisations can apply for up to £500 towards small projects to assist them in delivering events and coaching activities.

For large projects, organisations can apply for up to £5,000
